

FOUNDATIONAL DISCIPLINES

Bachelor's degree students complete coursework in three foundational disciplines—humanities, scientific inquiry and quantitative reasoning, and social sciences—to obtain broad experience in the liberal arts.

Students must complete 12 units from the following areas that satisfy the foundational disciplines requirement.

- Humanities (p. 1) (4 units)
- Scientific Inquiry and Quantitative Reasoning (p. 1) (4 units)
- Social Sciences (p. 2) (4 units)

Two foundational disciplines courses must fulfill a U.S. and global perspectives requirement (p. 2). One philosophy course within the four humanities units fulfills a professional ethics requirement (p. 3).

Humanities

Courses from these areas satisfy the humanities requirement:

Art history, classics, comparative literary studies, English literature, languages other than English (up to two units), history, humanities (HUM), music history, philosophy, religion, and some courses in Black studies, languages with literature, gender studies, performance studies, radio/television/film, and theatre.
